ACADEMIC REPORT for 2024-2025


Dear Parents:

We are pleased to present to you the **CSCS Academic Report** for the 2024-2025 school year, which provides pertinent information on the educational progress of students at CSCS from Kindergarten to Grade 12. This report will provide information on assessments, standardized testing results, and academic highlights for all campuses.

Earlier in the year, CSCS students performed at a high level academically, and we were blessed to see our Senior class earn over **\$4 million** in scholarship funds with **79%** college bound immediately following high school and **21%** pursuing missions, joining the military, entering the workforce, or taking a gap year before college. More importantly, much of our focus is on students understanding a personal relationship with Jesus Christ and student training in a biblical worldview. This fulfills our mission of Christ-centered, excellent education.

Colorado Springs Middle School:

- Results from class surveys showed **74%** of students stated that "the content of the course caused them to grow in their understanding of the Gospel and Biblical Truth."
- Notably, **63%** of the class chose to take part in the Door Ceremony, marking a meaningful moment of spiritual reflection and dedication since it was student-focused rather than parent-centered.
- **26%** of CSCS middle school students were on the high honor roll for the entire school year.
- Three students came to know the Lord through Chapel or Bible Classes.
- Middle School students participated in the ACSI/GCU International STEM Competition for the third year and placed 3rd in Robotic and 3rd in Onsite design which are two categories CSCS has not placed in before. In May the same group competed in a Roller Coaster STEM competition at Elitch Gardens and placed 2nd and 3rd on their roller coaster designs.
- MS hosted its first August parent orientation night which was very successful and well-attended. Parents were able to meet teachers, hear about middle school and ask questions.

Colorado Springs Elementary K-5

- Grades 3,4,5 used a Spiritual Growth survey, developed by the Assistant Principal, to assess the spiritual understanding and growth of their students. This survey was highly effective in revealing concepts that students struggle to understand or believe.
- Every classroom teacher in all grade levels completed an assessment for **Outcome 2** such as daily discussions in literature, science and current events to help student identify perspectives that align with God's teachings.
- IOWA Assessment results confirm our students are performing above the national average at all grade levels in reading and math.
- The K/5 and 1/4 Buddies Program has been instrumental in fostering leadership, mentorship, and service. High School students actively support and guide younger students, strengthening relationships across grade levels.
- Students are developing strong moral character with clear evidence of spiritual growth, thoughtful
 reflection, and application of biblical teachings. Our achievement of **Outcome 4** remains very high,
 nearly 100%.
- **Outcome 6**, developing lifelong learners, jumped from **82% to 99%**, due to hands-on activities, research projects, and collaboration.

Woodland Park K-8

• For **Outcome1**, students must have an in-depth knowledge of scripture and know various Bible verses (hiding God's Word in their hearts). This number went from 94% to 98%.

- The middle school students grew in their reading level using the STAR reading test over the last year. The average growth for each class is: 6th grade by 2.4 grade equivalent years; 7th grade by 1.5 grade equivalent years; 8th grade by 2.1 grade equivalent years.
- 100% of 4th grade students participated in a peer teaching exercise, effectively conveying concepts derived from a Biblical worldview test to younger students.
- 2nd/3rd grade students learned the definitions of honorable character traits and journaled how they were displaying one of these traits here at school. All the students participated. 86% of the K/1st grade students correctly answered workbook pages regarding appropriate behavior/choices.
- 90% of our 9th graders actively engaged in the biology macromolecule unit, creating exceptional PowerPoint presentations and even developing trivia facts to share with the class. In 7th grade, 95% of students demonstrated genuine interest and curiosity during the ecology unit, especially in discussions about a Christian's role in environmental stewardship.
- K-5 grades achieved above the National Norm on the IOWA Basic Skills Assessment in reading and math.

CSCS School-wide Learning Outcomes

The vision of Colorado Springs Christian educators is that a maturing CSCS student:

- 1) Professes understanding and committing to a personal relationship with Christ and demonstrates ongoing spiritual development. (Ends: 1.2.1, 1.4, 1.5)
 - a) Can explain the gospel message
 - b) Pursues spiritual maturity and a deepening dependence upon the Holy Spirit by practicing spiritual disciplines such as devotions, personal Bible study, prayer, memorization, and attending a local church
- 2) Develops, articulates, and defends a biblical world view and operates from that perspective. (Ends: 1.2.3.2)
 - a) Is able to communicate differences between Christianity and other worldviews
 - b) Trains to dialog effectively with those who hold other worldviews
 - c) Trains to defend one's faith
- 3) Is academically prepared in all required areas to be ready for the next desired level of academic pursuit. (Ends: 1.2.5, 1.3, 1.3.1, 1.3.3, 1.3.4, 1.3.5) The following may be included:
